Perfect Storm Brings Health Crisis

storm' 'perfect is wreaking havoc worldwide and it's even devastating more for people living in poverty. The crises that grip our headlines - conflict, cost of living, climate change and coronavirus are bearing down on resource-poor putting countries and decades of development progress at risk.

As we have scarcely found our feet from the impact of COVID-19, we are now having to deal with a cost of living crisis of growing proportions. No corner of the world was immune to the financial shock from the pandemic and this is exacerbated by the conflict between Russia and Ukraine.

The impact of the war on charities' efforts to deal with a range of pressing global concerns pales beside the experience of those living through it. Yet the war in Ukraine demands UK citizens' sympathy and donations. Add to this that the public is made poorer by inflation and the increased cost of living, and you see they have less money for other charitable causes.

In the countries where we work, demand for a reduced supply of commodities, such as grains and fuel, mean that food and medicines are more expensive and this increases the need for international support.

COVID-19 looms large again and news of winter preparations reminds us this pandemic is far from over. As the pandemic struck, EMMS International started new projects to impact reduce the of COVID-19 in Malawi, India and Nepal. This included improving water supplies at health facilities to reduce COVID-19 infections, and boosting hospitals' oxygen supplies to treat patients.

But pre-existing challenges didn't disappear - poor infrastructure, a global shortage of healthcare workers and the burden of disease still loomed large. Duncan Hospital in Bihar had hoped to expand its training of nurses. Instead, building of the new college halted when almost all the hospital's staff contracted COVID-19.

Climate change is not a new crisis for any of us. We all bear the brunt of excessive emissions of greenhouse gases and destruction of forests and wetlands.

Dr. Cathy Ratcliff, Chief Executive of EMMS International, explains: "We've seen serious climate change for years in many countries, in floods, droughts, storms, heatwaves, reduced crop yields, increased poverty and increased disease and injury.

"The world is changing in just about every arena. COVID-19, the climate crisis and conflict in Europe tell us all that the world is interconnected, and illustrate what happens when society doesn't act on early warning signs."

This is a challenging time for organisations that serve people in times of crisis. The volunteering charity Raleigh International Trust went into voluntary liquidation after cuts to the aid budget and the impact of COVID-19 "had an irreversible impact" on its finances.

Cathy continues, "EMMS International is grateful for the generosity of its supporters through recent global challenges. All the same, last year we had to use reserves to help our partners through this crisis and this isn't sustainable. We need to step up together. We're asking you to continue stand together to with us in support of those whose stories do not hit the headlines, but who are feeling the growing impact of this perfect storm of conflict, cost of living, climate change and coronavirus."

The global healthcare crisis demands bold and urgent action. EMMS International has launched an ambitious fundraising drive to recruit, train and find sustainable employment for a further 300 healthcare professionals to help address skills shortages in hospitals and healthcare centres.

The programme will especially target vulnerable women and girls, providing them with a rare opportunity to gain a profession and pursue their own dreams.

Christina Mkandawire is a nurse midwife technician in Malawi and an alumna of EMMS-sponsored training. She explains: "If it was not for EMMS International, I could not be where I am today. You took me at a time when I needed help most in my life. My parents could not manage to provide the much-needed financial support to complete my studies. You treated me as your own daughter by providing everything that a student needed."

Having completed her training, Christina now works in a community health facility close to home. Her

presence improves access to healthcare and also gives her the opportunity to earn a living and inspire future generations who rarely see young, female role models.

From 2022-2028, EMMS International aims to boost and develop the healthcare workforce across Malawi, Nepal and India by providing access to the pathway to 300 potential healthcare professionals. Learning from operating small-scale scholarship schemes like the one that supported Christina Mkandawire has shown EMMS that scholarship access alone is not always enough. EMMS has developed the Healthcare Pathway increase to successful outcomes for the most disenfranchised women and girls.

Dr Arie Glas Medical Director, Mulanje Mission Hospital, Malawi

The increased cost of fuel, medicines, and all other imported goods have made balancing our budget very difficult.

Medicines have seen a 40% price increase in just a few months. Simultaneously, the Malawi Kwacha was devalued by 25%. In practice, this means that we have to make difficult decisions.



Dr Saira Paulose Executive Director, Emmanuel Hospital Association, India

Assam is reeling under the effects of incessant rain and floods.

During the COVID-19 pandemic many lives were lost, and mental healthrelated issues continue to rise, with people living in fear of

recurrent infection. The loss of livelihood has also pushed many into poverty.

Soaring food and energy prices, poverty, unemployment, increasing trafficking, endangered food security, disincentives to farmers, and inadequate policy interventions are also major challenges India faces. Many patients can't even afford transport to hospital.

TATe have witnessed how fragile our human lives are to these crises. We have experienced that conflict in one region contributes to hunger in another, and that environmental degradation unsustainable and patterns consumption threaten the lives and livelihoods of all.

Aid Cuts Continue to Hit World's Poorest

A year on from the cut in the UK aid budget, the impact is still being felt in the work of charities and the lives of those whom they seek to serve.

Then-Chancellor Rishi Sunak slashed aid spending from 0.7% to 0.5%, undermining the UK's commitment global to health, vulnerable women and girls and other vital programmes worldwide.

Cuts also meant delays in projects starting. EMMS International resisted the cut, as the people it should have helped in 2021 quite simply were no longer alive by the time the delayed project started in 2022. But the UK government was immovable, and so families went through their pain and trauma without newly developed services which are now beginning to bring pain relief, home-based care, trained health workers and the start of evidence to help the Nepali government decide how best to develop these services.

The commitment of dedicated, regular givers means EMMS can stand by its global partners and mitigate the impact delayed aid brought. "The climate crisis is a healthcare crisis in Malawi. We need to do all we can to minimise the impact. It's always a delight to welcome the EMMS International


