arly marriage and teenage pregnancy all too often derail girls' hopes for the future. In an attempt to break the cycle of poverty, girls or their family members often turn to dangerous migrant work. Work that can result in injury or even death; pushing families further into the poverty they are trying to escape.

Your gift this Christmas could help develop the Healthcare Career Pathway so that vulnerable girls in Nepal, India and Malawi have the chance to gain a profession and pursue their own dreams.

They can provide muchneeded care in their communities while providing for themselves and their families. At the same time, they and their families are protected from the perils of poverty.

Making a way for girls in India

Dreams have already started to become a reality thanks to your support and the work of our partner, Duncan Hospital in Bihar, India.

Anya is 18 years old and is from Haraiya village, Raxaul. She has

three sisters and one younger brother. Since there are four girls in her family, her mother is ill-treated by her grandmother and her community. Her father is a daily wage labourer and her mother is a housewife. Her mother takes care of the family too.

During the pandemic, her father lost his business and struggled to make ends meet selling vegetables. Sometimes they are not even able to have three meals a day. Anya's parents don't have enough money to pay the education fees of the children. Anya helps support her family by giving tuition to the local children.

Anya's ambition is to be a nurse so that she can serve her community and support her family. Being on the Healthcare Career Pathway means Anya is on her way to making these dreams a reality.

Going the extra mile in Malawi and Nepal

As well as opening up fresh career opportunities, you could also help train much-needed healthcare specialists.

In Nepal, Nurse Manju has started her Masters in Nursing to develop her clinical leadership skills to continue pioneering palliative care.

In Malawi, Nurse Constance started her BSc in Paediatric Nursing to improve the specialist care given to children.

SUNITA UPDATE:

Your generosity and match funding from the UK government are bringing compassion in rural Nepal. Our CEO, Dr Cathy Ratcliff, gives you an update from Nepal.

I spent November in Nepal, meeting our partners and seeing for myself the first stages of the Sunita project - a three-year initiative to develop palliative care services in hard-to-reach regions of Nepal. I've been honoured to see first-hand the impact this project is already having on the lives of people who might not otherwise access the care they deserve. As the project progresses, we aim to make significant and sustainable change to the lives of vulnerable girls, who are often the main carers of people needing palliative care, as well as those living in extreme poverty at the end of their lives.



Bijuli is in her early 80s and lives in Pokhara, Nepal. She is a palliative care patient of EMMS International's local partner, Green Pastures Hospital. She was referred to the hospital because she couldn't afford her care. After she had a stroke her medical bills were being paid for by a loan and the support of her family.

Despite doing his best to care for her, Bijuli's husband was worried about his wife's health and the family's mounting financial pressures. When the palliative care team visited them at home, their burdens were lifted.

The team found Bijuli bedridden and in a very fragile condition, barely able to speak. Over a number of months the team (doctor, physio, nurses and counsellors) visited to provide holistic support to Bijuli and her family.

They learned of the debt the

family had amassed in search of a cure which did not exist. Her granddaughter-in-law has been the main carer. Through the visits she and other family members have learned physiotherapy techniques, methods to avoid bedsores and how to administer medicines. Bijuli grew in strength and health.

Her young carer explained: "Previously I was looking after her because I felt indebted for the care that she gave to me and my infant child during my pregnancy. It was more of a responsibility, and I was suffering, but things have changed now. I know how to take care of her and it's less burdensome. Even if I go out sometimes, I miss her and feel concerned about her. She is old and is a motherly figure to me."

Through Sunita, more people will have access to vital palliative care services and their carers will have help to share the burden.



Duncan Hospital Centenary Vision

Help raise the final £500,000 of this £4.5 million vision to improve healthcare in rural north India.

uncan Hospital sits on the India-Nepal border and has served vulnerable communities in the region since 1930. We're proud to have Duncan Hospital as a longstanding partner and to support them in their centenary vision.

To mark 100 years of this faithful, caring institution we have committed to improving the healthcare services and infrastructure so that they can continue to serve their community.

The vision involves the hospital modelling healthcare access for all, especially the most vulnerable; training and employing more vulnerable women and girls as healthcare professionals;

becoming a national training Centre of Excellence by building a new College of Nursing and Accommodation block; and becoming environmentally and financially sustainable in the long term.

Designed in 2018 and started in 2019, elements of this vision were delayed by COVID-19. The hospital was hit hard by the pandemic and your support helped provide oxygen supplies when patients were struggling to breathe.


The region has a critical shortage of health workers, fragile health systems, poor health infrastructure, and a heavy burden of sickness and disease. This puts immense pressure

on The Duncan Hospital, which struggles to find enough trained, skilled healthcare personnel. The devastating impact of COVID-19 in Bihar has come on top of many other health challenges in the region, including malaria, tuberculosis, leprosy, and HIV/AIDS.

With your support, by 2030, we can see Duncan Hospital mark its 100th year as a stronger, more resilient healthcare institution. To make this ambitious vision a reality we have to raise £4,509,926. ulanje Mission Hospital (MMH) in southern Malawi is a step closer to energy security thanks to EMMS International's Mokwanira project to improve healthcare infrastructure within hard-to-reach communities.

Energy supplies in Malawi are erratic and vulnerable to disruption. After Cyclone Ana, the country's electricity supply has been severely compromised.

When electricity isn't available, hospitals rely on generators to maintain essential services. However, fuel is expensive and Malawi has been experiencing extreme fuel shortages for more than two months, with no end in sight.

Thanks to donor support, EMMS International has completed a major upgrade of the solar power system at MMH.

The hospital can produce more of its power and reduce costs of buying electricity and generator fuel. At times it even produces more than is needed, so there is room for possible expansion of services in the future.

The system is also fine-tuned to their needs. As a result, Mulanje Mission Hospital is able to provide greener, stronger healthcare to its local community.

With your support, EMMS International can also help MMH to install clean, reliable water supplies in rural health centres where there is none.
